Of Gifts and Giving

This time it's personal. No, We're not going to discuss how mad we can make Sylvester Stallone or Liam Neeson; rather, I'd like to relate a story of a dental journey and highlight a resource for our community.

In 1980, there were two local high school students that spent most of their summers working in the supermarket and surfing- a lot. Their wise mother asked (demanded really) that they might want to start thinking about a career path that did not involve sand and salt water. The boys were encouraged (forced) to volunteer in different professional environments. One of those early sorties happened to be the Children's Dental Health Clinic at Long Beach Memorial Medical Center. So it was that your co-editors developed a keen interest in dentistry.

Back in the early 80's, things were different; the dentists we observed at the time wore no gloves- just mustaches and big hair. The Children's Dental Health Clinic was located on the ground floor of what is now the new Miller Children's Pavilion. The old clinic had 4 chairs/operatories, one administrator, a part-time book- keeper and a couple of dynamite registered dental assistants. This place was fun and on a mission to help those less fortunate in our community. They took only cash, based on the patient's ability to pay (sliding scale), as payment for services. The pediatric and general dentists planned and treated patients as they would in their own offices.

They were not paid that much for their services but they all looked forward to their "CDHC Days" because of the camaraderie and sense of purpose. They made much more emotionally and spiritually than a written check could ever compensate. What a gift.

Life has a way of coming full circle. For some, it happens early. For others it is not realized until they are inculcated with regret. I now work in the program that sparked my interest in this fine profession. The Children's Dental Health Clinic is in its 82nd year of being the dental safety net resource for our community. We now have a 15 operatory, purpose-built facility that we lease from the hospital. We train 3 full-time pediatric dental residents and have rotating OMFS, and general practice residents from U.S.C. We are a clinical training site for the V.A.L.B.'s endodontic residents and the Cerritos college future R.D.A.'s and R.D.H.'s. We've offset our labor costs by becoming a sort of mini dental school. Many Harbor Dental Society Dentists started out helping at the CDHC a day a week and many continue to help with treatment (thank you Oscar), as donors or as foundation board members. Thanks to a generous donor, our school-based clinic on Catalina Island was recently completely upgraded.

As a teaching facility, we are involved in a fair amount of dental research projects. Our recent dental sealant project was partially funded by the HDS Foundation. The children of the greater Long Beach area join me in saying thank you. As a non-profit organization, the Children's Dental Health Clinic has grown and thrived because of mutually beneficial partnerships, supporters and mature relationships. We are but one resource in a community of dentists that give so much- mostly "behind the scenes".

Connecting to the Community

As a member of CDA and Harbor Dental Society, you're connected with a community of nearly 25,000 dentists who care enough to make a difference. Adult Denti-Cal benefits eliminated by the state in 2009 will be partially restored in 2014, however, the program remains chronically underfunded and leaves many, including the working poor, without access to care. To help provide oral health care services to the large number of expected patients, volunteer dental and health professionals including general dentists, oral surgeons, dental hygienists, assistants, lab technicians, nurses and pharmacists are in need. Additionally, community volunteers are needed to assist with registration, clinic setup, data entry, escorting patients, translating, and much more.

Patients will receive cleanings, fillings, extractions, oral health education and assistance in finding a dentist for follow-up care.

Giving a little to the community brings smiles to many

A collaborative effort between the Ayuda Clinic, Harbor Dental Society and Harbor Dental Society Foundation is another example of how working together brings the community closer. On October 19, 2013 a free mobile dental clinic in the gym of Paramount High School came to life, helping patients leave with smiles. Many of the patients included elementary and middle school students as well as adults. The USC mobile clinic provided essential dental care – fillings, extractions, fluoride treatments and sealants.

Dr. Max Martinez and Dr. Ashok Mehta who are executive board leaders of Harbor Dental Society and HDS Foundation, represented Harbor at this community outreach event and volunteered their dental expertise to those in need along with the Ayuda Clinic volunteers and students from the USC Dental Program. Paramount High School students from the Health Careers Academy program volunteered their time to assist the

dentists and help patient complete the required paperwork.


Dr. Martinez said, “This is just one example of how working together for the common good can make a difference.” Approximately 50 patients were seen at the mobile clinic, and more than \$25,000.00 in free dental treatment was provided to those in need of dental care.

Dr. Mehta added, “This is a first of a kind event for HDS Foundation and Harbor Dental Society. The HDS Board of Directors and HDS Foundation Board of Trustees are very excited to be able to support time and funds to help needy children and adults in the local community.”

It took a year of planning to get the location, volunteers and resources put together. Dr. Martinez and Dr. Mehta helped spearhead these efforts to turn the plan into a reality. The event was attended by public and school officials including Paramount Vice Mayor Diane Martinez, Councilmember Tom Hansen, Paramount High School Board President Vivian Hansen, Vice President Sonya Cuellar, Board Member Alicia Anderson, and Manuel San Miguel, Director of Student Services.

Ayuda is a dental program out of USC dental school where students and faculty volunteers provide dental treatment using mobile equipment to help underserved children at elementary school throughout Los Angeles and Orange County. Twice a year, volunteer doctors in cooperation with Ayuda travel to Central and South America to deliver free patient care. The Ayuda program is headed by Dr. Harris Done, a faculty member of USC and dentist in Orange County.

Established October 6, 1915, Harbor Dental Society’s mission is to promote excellence in dentistry, serve its members, and lead the dental community in its responsibility to the public. Harbor Dental Society Foundation’s mission is to collaborate with like-organizations to leverage resources in improving the oral health of the underserved community. Justifiable Criticism

In order for the profession of dentistry to meet its obligation to serve the public and protect the best interests of patients, it may be necessary from time to time to inform a patient that the quality of work provided in another dental office is below the standard of care. How to inform a patient that their dental care has been faulty while attempting to maintain their confidence in the dental profession is a challenge that demands tact and thoughtfulness.

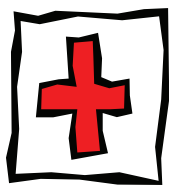
Criticizing the work of another dentist requires that we balance the ethical principles of patient autonomy, veracity and non-maleficence. Patient autonomy cannot exist without the patient being informed of the condition of their dentition and of the quality of the restorations present. Veracity requires that we be truthful in our assessment of the patient's dental condition. Non-maleficence suggests that we provide this information in a way that minimizes the harm to the patient with respect to their trust and confidence in the dental profession. Making unjustified harsh or critical comments about a colleague not only undermines the patient's confidence in that colleague, but also casts you in a poor light because you appear judgmental and self-serving.

Section 1.F. of the CDA Code of Ethics states, "A dentist has the obligation to inform patients of their present oral health status." The advisory opinion coupled with that section continues by saying, "It is the duty of a dentist to report instances of gross and/or continual faulty treatment. When informing patients of the status of their oral

health, the dentist shall exercise care that the comments made are justifiable. This would include finding out from the previous treating dentist under what circumstances and conditions the treatment was performed. A difference of opinion as to preferred treatment shall not be communicated to the patient in a disparaging manner which implies mistreatment."

The Judicial Council recommends that you always be open and honest in your discussions with patients. Remain unbiased in your conversation with the patient and avoid language that would be critical of your colleagues when it concerns merely a difference of opinion. Contact the previous dentist to make sure that you have all the facts, not just the patient's perspective, when forming opinions about previous care. Making disparaging comments about another practitioner may also expose you to the possibility of a libel suit. Focus on the condition of the patient's dental work and not on the person who provided it. Offer to contact the previous dentist on behalf of the patient and let them know that you will work together to correct any problems that exist. The end result will always be better if the working relationship between you, your patient and the previous dentist are cooperative rather than adversarial.

Use of Botox in dentistry is a fine line

As questions increase about the use of Botox in dentistry, The Dentists Insurance Company advises California dentists that the use of preparations such as Botox and Dysport must be within the scope of dental practice.

"If doctors are practicing legally within the scope of their dental license, there is coverage under TDIC's professional liability policy," said TDIC Underwriting Director Dora Earls. However, Earls noted that if the Dental Board of California determines that use of Botox or similar drugs is not within the scope of dental practice, there is no TDIC coverage.

In California, dentistry is defined by the California Business and Professions Code section 1625. The dental board lists the pertinent language of the code as, "diagnosis or treatment, by surgery or other method, of diseases and lesions and the correction of malpositions of the human teeth, alveolar process, gums, jaws or associated structures; and such diagnosis or treatment may include all necessary related procedures as well as the use of drugs, anesthetic agents and physical evaluation..." The board states that a dentist may use any legally prescribed drugs to treat patients as long as the treatment is within this specified scope of practice.

Additionally, in California dentists may not use Botox cosmetically without an Elective Facial Cosmetic Surgery permit issued by the dental board. Licensed dentists who have completed residencies in oral and maxillofacial surgery and additional criteria outlined by the dental board can apply for an Elective Facial Cosmetic Surgery permit. There are two categories for these permits. Category I relates to cosmetic facial surgery, such as contouring of the osteocartilaginous facial structure, and Category II relates to cosmetic soft tissue contouring or rejuvenation. The details of this system can be found in the California Business and Professions Code section 1638.1.

Currently, there are 26 dentists in California with these permits, according to the dental board. The dental board also states, "Some permit holders may not be authorized to perform all cosmetic surgery procedures within the scope of the Elective Facial Cosmetic Surgery permit." Additionally, the dental board notes that all procedures authorized under the Elective Facial Cosmetic Surgery permit must be performed in an acute care hospital or a certified surgical center as defined in California Business and Professions Code section 1638.1(f).

Botox and Dysport are commercial preparations of botulinum toxin derived from the bacterium *Clostridium botulinum*, a nerve "blocker" that binds to the nerves and prevents the release of acetylcholine, a neurotransmitter. The result is muscle paralysis, according to the National Center for Biotechnology Information. Botulinum toxin is approved by the FDA, and its most common use is in applications to minimize fine facial wrinkles.

Concerning professional liability coverage and training or certification for dentists to use Botox or similar drugs, TDIC's endorsement states: "Before performing the alleged injection(s), you must have obtained any license, permit, certification or training required by the state dental licensing authority where you practice."

Credit Card Security Standards

Dental practices are among the businesses required to comply with Payment Card Industry (PCI) Data Security Standards that apply to any person or business that stores, processes or transmits data for payment cards that have the MasterCard, Visa, American Express, Discover or JCB logo on them.

The PCI Data Security Standards are not a federal or state law, and compliance details and deadlines vary from merchant to merchant. While it is likely that financial institutions will contact their merchants, CDA advises members to contact the appropriate financial institution (*see below*) for specific compliance information.

The PCI Data Security Standards were created in 2006 by the Payment Card Industry Security Standards Council, composed of representatives from the above-mentioned companies. Under the standards, any business that stores, processes or transmits payment card data will fall into one of several compliance levels set forth by the Security Standards Council. Each individual acquiring bank will be able to inform merchants of which compliance level they fall into and what their specific compliance requirements are. Very basically, the more transactions a merchant processes, the more complicated the compliance requirements get. If a merchant is processing transactions and storing the payment card data on-site, the compliance requirements become even more involved.

CDA recommends against storing payment card information on-site unless it is absolutely necessary. Not storing the information will keep patients' personal financial information safer, and will make compliance with the standards much simpler. The Security Standards Council sets the standards for security, but each individual payment card brand sets forth its own program for compliance.

The Security Standards Council does not enforce the standards, nor does it prescribe consequences for violations. Enforcement of the PCI Data Security Standards is left to the specific credit card companies and acquiring banks. According to the standards, they can issue fines and restrict the ability to process credit card transactions until the person or business is compliant.

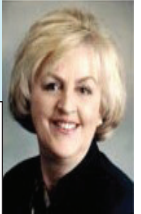
